Two dedicated team members and supporters Angela Ward and Erin Schreader have worked so hard to fight for a change in our Brampton Bylaws, and they succeeded! I am so happy and proud of these girls for dedicating so much of their time and efforts into this:) Effective Jan. 2017, pet stores will no longer be able to sell dogs and cats bred for this purpose in less than ideal conditions. The new bylaw mandates that the pet stores can only adopt out animals from registered shelters and rescues.

This team we have built together is just incredible, the amazing work we do on a daily basis and our mission to save animals is just unreal. Every supporter, foster, and volunteer brings something so special to the Rescue and together we will continue our mission to save animals and will one day reach our goal of building an ALL PAWS RESCUE animal sanctuary.

ALL PAWS RESCUE is thrilled to announce that on September 19, 2016 due to the efforts of Angela Ward, Erin Schreader, City of Brampton staff and the support of our members that we have been successful in having a Brampton Bylaw passed that bans the sale of dogs and cats in pet stores. These stores now will only be allowed to adopt out animals from shelters and Rescues. They can no longer sell animals after January 1st, 2017. This is a big accomplishment and a win for the animals.

This change was not simple, a lot of time, effort and research was necessary to effect this change. Change is possible when good people stand together for a just and right cause.

We want to thank Brampton City Council for putting animals first and having the vision that our homeless animals have a right to a beautiful forever life and that puppy mills and irresponsible breeders should no longer be able to sell their animals to pet stores for resale in our community.

We are all so thrilled at this accomplishment by our members and our group. We will not stop until this bylaw is enacted throughout Ontario and moving onwards to Canada.

Thank you everyone, especially Angela and Erin. Now let's keep rescuing these sweet animals because things are getting better for their prospects for a better life. Thank you to our partner pet stores, Pet Valu and Global Pet Foods who have been doing the right thing for a long time now.

Making a difference



Why does the bylaw banning the sale of dogs and cats for profit in pet stores matter to us?

Every year homeless cats and dogs are euthanized due to lack of space to house them and a lack or resources to care for them. Along with the homeless issue it is a fact that many of these pet store animals come from unethical breeding in kitty and puppy mills where the parent animals live in deplorable conditions and are bred relentlessly with no care given to health or genetic conditions. In both instances there are animals that need our help and need the exposure to the public to find their forever homes. By banning the sale for profit of animals in pet stores we create opportunities for homeless animals to be vetted, loved and then available to the public for adoption. They get their chance to shine. This new bylaw does not stop the breeding by ethical breeders of animals that they sell through their own businesses, it only bans the sale of the animals in pet stores.

Moving forward dogs and cats available for adoption in stores will be the property of registered shelters and rescues. These organizations remain responsible for the health and welfare of the animals. In the case of All Paws Rescue animals, volunteers visit our animals daily in the pet stores to clean and play with the animals and report back any concerns or issues with the kitty's to make sure our animals are always happy and healthy.

How did our team make this happen?

After the pictures of Cleo the Abyssinian kitten at PJ's pets in the Bramalea City Centre went viral and the public demanded action a petition was created. The petition was online and in person. All Paws Team Leaders and volunteers drove all over Brampton handing the petition out and having local business' endorse and participate. This petition received over 80,000 signatures!!!

Next came weeks of researching not only the benefits of banning the sale of cats and dogs in pet stores, but also the reasons store owners may not want this. Angela Ward and Erin Schreader created a lengthy proposal outlining these pros and cons of a ban, as well as showcasing all the other municipalities that already have this bylaw put in place. This proposal was sent to counsellor Grant Gibson, who after many phone calls, agreed this was an important cause that he was willing to bring to the Council Chambers for action. Before we knew it, we were invited to attend a council meeting to discuss our issue!! Over the course of nearly a year, numerous meetings were held for this cause to work out the fine details of the how, what and when.



Finally a decision was made, and our campaign was a success!!!!

Our Rescue did it! Starting January 2017, pet stores are not legally allowed to sell cats or dogs for profit in the City of Brampton.

Further details will come including how this will be policed, and exactly what boundaries will be set out. Your All Paws team will be sure to fill you in on this success as updates are provided to Erin and Angela. Next up....Erin and Angela plan on tackling Dufferin County!




Meet **Mosaic!** This beautiful dilute calico is 8 years old; she was surrendered to the Rescue.



Medical Corner - Ringworm



What Kind of Infection is it?

Ringworm is the common name for the skin infection caused by a group of fungi; it is not caused by a worm at all. The fungi feed upon the dead cells of skin and hair causing in people a classic round, red lesion with a ring of scale around the edges and normal recovering skin in the center. Because the ring of irritated, itchy skin looked like a worm, the infection was erroneously named. The fungi responsible are called dermatophytes, meaning plants that live on the skin, thus the more correct term for ringworm is dermatophytosis. The characteristic ring appearance is primarily a human phenomenon. In animals, ringworm frequently looks like a dry, grey, scaly patch but can also mimic any other skin lesion and have any appearance.







Where Would my Pet Pick up this Infection?


The spores of dermatophyte fungi are extremely hardy in the environment; they can live for years. All it takes is skin contact with a spore to cause infection; however, the skin must be abraded as the fungus cannot infect healthy intact skin. This means that freshly shaved, scraped, or scratched skin is especially vulnerable.

Infected animals are continuously dropping spore-covered hairs as infected hairs break off into the environment. Some animals are carriers, who never show signs of skin irritation themselves but can infect others readily. A carrier might be subclinically infected, which means their skin is infected but shows no visible lesions. Ringworm patients undergoing treatment commonly fit in this category towards the end of their care; the skin is still dropping spores but the visible signs of infection have cleared up. A carrier can also carry the spores on their fur without being infected, much as an inanimate object might have spores on its surface incidentally. In this situation, the spores can be easily washed away. There is no obvious way to distinguish between these two types of carrier state.

There are several species of dermatophyte fungi. Different species of fungi come from different kinds of animals or even from soil thus determining the ringworm species can help determine the source of the fungal infection.

Can I get this Infection?

Yes, ringworm is contagious to people; however, some people are at greater risk than others. The fungus takes advantage of skin belonging to those with reduced immune capacity. This puts young animals and children, elderly people and pets, those who are HIV+, people on chemotherapy or taking medication after transfusion or organ transplant, and highly stressed people and animals at high risk. In general, if you do not already have ringworm at the time your pet is diagnosed, you probably will not get it. Keep in mind that skin must be abraded (irritated) to become infected.



How does the Doctor know this is Really Ringworm?

In some cases, we know for sure that the pet has dermatophyte fungi while in other cases we are only highly suspicious. Ringworm lesions on animal skin are rarely the classic ring-shaped as in people (in fact, in animals, lesions are often not even itchy) thus some testing is usually necessary as we will describe.







Wood's Light (Fluorescence)

Microsporum canis, the most common ringworm fungus, will fluoresce apple green in approximately 50% of cases. Fluorescence is an easy test to perform and may provide a strong clue that there are dermatophytes on the skin. Further testing is usually needed, however, to absolutely confirm diagnosis. *Microscopic Examination*

Your veterinarian may wish to examine some hairs for microscopic spores. If spores can be seen on damaged hairs then the diagnosis of ringworm is confirmed; however, as spores are difficult to see, many veterinarians skip this step.

Fungal Culture

Here, some hairs and skin scales are placed on a culture medium in an attempt to grow one of the ringworm fungi. The advantage of this test is that it not only can confirm ringworm but can tell exactly which species of fungus is there. Knowing the identity of the fungus may help determine the source of infection. The disadvantage, however, is that fungi require at least 10 days to grow out.

Also, this is the only test that is helpful in determining if animal is an asymptomatic carrier. The other tests require an apparent skin lesion (abnormal tissue) to test. A pet with no apparent lesions can be combed over its whole body, and the fur and skin that are removed can be cultured. Carrier animals are usually cats living with several other cats.

Biopsy

Sometimes the lesions on the skin are so uncharacteristic that a skin biopsy is necessary to obtain a diagnosis. Fungal spores are quite clear in these samples and the diagnosis may be ruled in or out. Depending on the outcome of preliminary tests, your veterinarian may begin ringworm treatment right away or postpone it until after more definitive results are available.

Treatment

Commitment is the key to success especially if you have more than one pet. Infected animals are constantly shedding spores into the environment (your house) thus disinfection is just as important as treatment of the affected pet. The infected pet will require isolation while the environment is disinfected and should not be allowed back into the clean area until a culture is negative. Ideally all pets should be cultured and isolated until they have been deemed clear of infection, at which point they can be allowed back into the clean area.

Infected pets generally require oral medication, which may be supplemented with topical treatment (dipping, lotion, or both). Localized lesions might get away with topical treatment only.

Oral Medication for Infected Pets

There are primarily two medications being used to treat ringworm: griseofulvin and itraconazole. Both medications are relatively expensive, must be given with food, and have significant potential to cause birth defects in pregnant pets.

Treatment with either medication typically is continued for 1 to 2 months and should not be discontinued until the pet cultures negative. Stopping when the pet simply looks well visually frequently leads to recurrence of the disease.
